FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING, TUCSON-1971

The Hilton Inn in Tucson, Arizona was the site of the Fourth Annual Meeting of the A.A.S.P. The 105 registrants included palynologists from Canada, the United States, Japan, Taiwan, Brazil, Egypt, Israel, France, Sweden and the Netherlands. The excellent program, including outstanding papers, stimulating field trips, and gracious hosts all contributed toward a successful Fourth Annual Meeting. Subjects discussed by the speakers included biostratigraphic, ecologic, morphologic, statistical and computerization of palynologic studies from the Precambrian to Recent.

A pre-convention round-table conference on the Computerization of Palynology was held on October 13. All speakers stressed the need for international cooperation in this field and the beginning of an International Palynologic Data Bank Consortium was established.

The first day of the Annual Meeting included technical sessions on Cretaceous and Tertiary floras. The Annual Business Meeting and Luncheon of the Association was held from 12:00 to 2:00 P.M., presided over by Alfred Traverse, President of the A.A.S.P. Committee reports were presented to the Membership, followed by discussions from the floor. An interesting evening tour of the Geosciences Building "on the hill" followed the presentation of papers.

The second day of the Meeting was devoted to Quaternary and pre-Cretaceous palynology. The annual "smoker" of the A.A.S.P. was held around the pool of the Hilton Inn and included a "break" by the resident band and entertainer.

Two post-convention field trips were held following the Meeting on Saturday and Sunday, October 16 and 17. One examined the Lehner early man-mammoth site on October 16, led by P. S. Martin, A. Solomon, E. Haury and J. E. King. The second trip, led by R. H. Hevly, D. Schumacher, and G. O. W. Kremp, left on October 16 and lasted two days. This excursion included the Petrified Forest National Park and Meteor Crater.

The appreciation of the Executive Committee of the A.A.S.P. is extended to all who helped to make our Fourth Annual Meeting a rewarding experience. We especially thank Donald W. Engelhardt, Gerhard O. W. Kremp, Terah L. Smiley, Lois A. Nagy and Paul S. Martin who organized the Meeting; the members of the University of Arizona faculty, staff and graduate students, and the Tucson Chamber of Commerce who generously supported and aided the conduct of the Meeting; and the Members of the A.A.S.P., whose participation added materially to the success of the Meeting.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The Executive Committee Meetings of the A.A.S.P. were held on October 12 and 14, 1971. The following is a summary of the actions taken during these meetings:

- 1. Accepted the Treasurer's Report which stated assets of \$4,048.79 before payment for Proceedings Volume II.
- 2. Approved payment (\$1,882.40) to L.S.U. for copies of Proceedings Volume II.
- Accepted Membership Report which listed 287 Members and 4 Institutional Members.
- 4. Accepted the Editor's Report.
- 5. Approved that we continue to publish our Proceedings through I.S.U. as long as quality is maintained and costs remain at a reasonable level.
- 6. Adopted (effective October 8, 1971) Constitution and By-laws as approved by vote of the members, 163 for to 6 against.
- 7. Approved Tulsa, Oklahoma, as the mid-year Executive Committee Meeting site during late March or early April, 1972.
- 8. Voted to accept an invitation to hold the 1973 Annual Meeting in Anaheim, California.
- 9. Appointed Karl Newman, Doug Nichols, Ken Piel, Del Potter and Jaan Terasmae to serve as the 1971-72 Nominating Committee.
- 10. Appointed Al Traverse, Tate Ames and Bob Dunay to serve as the 1971-72 Ballot Committee.

- 11. Decided that the Constitution Committee should be dissolved.
- 12. Decided that the Long Range Planning Committee should be dissolved.
- 13. Decided that the Liaison Committee should be dissolved.
- 14. Accepted Paul Nygreen's resignation as the A.A.S.P. representative to the JCPI.
- 15. Approved expenditure of \$50 to the Roberta Beales' Fund of the "Save the Niagara Escarpment" Group.
- 16. Moved to draft and send a letter to N. F. Hughes concerning A.A.S.P.'s position on ICP.
- 17. Agreed to contact other regional palynological organizations in an effort to learn of their membership and activities.
- 18. Took other minor actions, records of which are in the Minutes of the Executive Committee Meetings of October 12 and 14, 1971.

MEMBERSHIP

A.A.S.P. Membership at the time of mailing of this Newsletter numbers 298. This includes 293 Members in good standing and 5 Institutional Members.

FOSSIL DINOFLAGELLATE TEACHING CONFERENCE

A repeat of the 1971 Teaching Conference on Fossil Dinoflagellates, conducted in August 1971 by W. R. Evitt at Stanford University, will be held in June, 1972.

The 1971 conference was attended by six oil company palynologists concerned with dinoflagellates. Lectures and microscope study in dinoflagellate morphology and interpretation, and discussions of problems in identification, description, and stratigraphic applications filled ten working days. Living freshwater and marine dinoflagellates, including both motile and encysted stages, were collected on a half-day field trip and studied in the lab.


