## NINTH ANNUAL AASP MEETING

1976 MID-YEAR EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

AASP's Board of Directors held its mid-year meeting at the LeBaron Hotel in Dallas, Texas on April 8th and 9th. Present at all or part of the meeting were:

A copy of the meeting minutes may be obtained from the Secretary-Treasurer. Following is a brief summary of the business transacted:

- 1. Accepted the <u>Membership Report</u> which listed a total of 426 members as of April 1, 1976.
- 2. Accepted the <u>Treasurer's Report</u> which listed total corporate assets of \$6031.06 as of April 1, 1976.
- 3. Accepted the Editor's Report which listed two Newsletters and a Membership Directory as having been published and distributed since the Houston meeting.
- 4. Annual Meetings
  - a. <u>Houston, 1975</u>: Reviewed and accepted Bill Elsik's report on the 8th Annual Meeting. Bill's excellent report includes confirmation that 285

- registrants participated in one or more parts of the meeting. The meeting produced a profit of \$3793.22, which will help to defray anticipated publishing deficits.
- b. <u>Halifax, 1976</u>: Reviewed the Halifax Meeting Committee's report. The tentative program listed in the March, 1976 Newsletter is now official.
- c. <u>Tulsa</u>, <u>1977</u>: Listened to a presentation by Leonard Eames on plans for the 10th Annual Meeting. The Mayo Hotel in downtown Tulsa has been selected as the convention site.
- d. Tempe, 1978: Reviewed and accepted a proposal by Jim Canright to hold the 11th Annual Meeting in Tempe, Arizona.

#### 5. Old Business

- a. Financial Development Committee: Bob Clarke anticipated that a statement soliciting tax exempt status for an AASP Foundation would be filed around May 15. If an advanced ruling can be obtained from the IRS, it is possible that tax exempt fund solicitation can begin this year. However, whether we will be a public or private foundation is a question that will require several years of operation before IRS makes a final decision.
- b. <u>International Commission for Palynology (ICP)</u>: Al Traverse was appointed as AASP's voting representative for the plenary session at the Fourth International Palynological Conference in Lucknow.
- c. <u>CIA Report</u>: Accepted Colin McGregor's report which indicated that exchanges of membership information had been effected with the USSR Commission on Palynology and the Palynological Committee for Africa.
- d. <u>Nominating Committee Report</u>: The slate of candidates nominated by the Committee is listed in a subsequent section of the Newsletter.
- e. Stratigraphic Correlation Chart Committee: Accepted F. X. Miller's telephoned communication in which he stated congressional funding of the project had not been approved but that funding probably would be forthcoming this year.
- f. Tenth Anniversary Volume Committee: Accepted Herb Sullivan's report which was presented by Bill Elsik. Present plans are to issue this commemorative publication as three separate volumes.
- g. <u>Maturation Symposium Contribution</u>: Subsequent to the mid-year meeting a decision was made to incorporate papers from the symposium into the Houston Proceedings Volume.
- h. Archives: The Hunt Botanical Library has been selected as the repository for AASP documents. Norm Norton was appointed chairman of the Committee.

#### 6. New Business

- a. <u>Membership Classes</u>: The Board unanimously voted to restrict membership classes to the two classes presently in force regular and institutional.
- b. AASP Emblem: Leonard Eames was assigned the task of researching membership sentiment regarding an AASP logo.
- c. Publisher Change: In a dramatic (and traumatic) sequence of discussions, a majority of the Board voted to sever publishing arrangements with LSU. The severance was made retroactive to the Houston Proceedings Volume. Hart Graphics, Austin, Texas, has been selected as the new publisher.
- 7. Discussed such other old and new business as necessary to bring the Board up to date.

THE SEVERED CORD

The decision by the Board to cease publishing the Proceedings in Geoscience and Man is one of the most significant decisions made since the inception of AASP. One of the positive aspects of the decision is that publication time could be cut in half. However, publishing costs money, and publication has to be defrayed when money isn't available. Since members cannot be expected to contribute more in dues, many think they are too high already, there are really only two significant future sources of money -- the AASP Foundation and sale of publications.

AASP received no money from the sale of its publications by <u>Geoscience and Man</u>. So, a second positive aspect of the decision is that it opens up a new source for funds. A third positive aspect is the potentiality for expanded publication. The future journal, whatever its name, need not be limited to publishing papers presented at annual meetings. This aspect of the decision could have the greatest future impact, and it is a potentiality exciting to contemplate.

There are negative aspects to the decision. One is that the excellent staff at Geoscience and Man was able to salvage some papers that normally would have been rejected because of poor preparation. Consequently, future authors are going to have to do their own writing, drafting and plate preparation. Our apologies to those authors who did follow the manuscript preparation guide, but there was always a significant number who didn't. One person even went so far as to submit what amounted to data summaries and presumed the paper would be written for him. That paper wasn't salvaged.

Everything considered, the Board believes the positive aspects of being able to publish, distribute, sell and in all other ways to control AASP publications, far outweighs the negative aspects of loss of the <u>Geoscience and Man</u> staff's assistance. The umbilicus is severed.

### HALIFAX MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION AND DEADLINE

Authors who intend to publish the papers they present at the Halifax meeting in the Halifax Proceedings Volume should have received a Manuscript Preparation Guide. If you haven't, please contact Sedley Barss. For yours, the reviewers' and the editor's convenience you are urged to format your paper as requested in the guide. Plate preparation is particularly critical. The plates will be reproduced exactly as submitted. Consequently, you will have to decide whether you want your speciments to appear with or without background and do your cutting and pasting accordingly. Poor plate preparation can ruin a good paper.

The deadline for submission of manuscripts probably will be January 15, 1977. The deadline will be firmed up at Halifax.

## ABSTRACTS FOR AASP/CIMP HALIFAX MEETING

On May 28 a request for abstracts went out to those who submitted titles for the program of the AASP/CIMP meeting in Halifax, Nova Scotia. A deadline of July 15 has been set for return of the abstracts. Anyone who intends to present a paper at the meeting, but who has not submitted a title, should get both title and abstract to Sedley Barss before July 15th.

GENERA FILE OF FOSSIL SPORES

The Jansonius and Hills <u>Genera File</u> is being issued this year as a Special Publication of the University of Calgary Department of Geology. A prospectus on the File may be obtained from either Jan or Len. In essence, the prospectus lists what appears to be a very good deal indeed. For a pre-publication price of \$50.00 Canadian for individuals, or \$110.00 Canadian for institutions, the following is received:

- 1. An alphabetically arranged file of 3300 5" X 8" cards on which are listed <u>all known genera</u> of microspores, megaspores, fungal spores and pollen.
- 2. A full generic diagnosis.
- 3. Complete bibliographic citation.
- 4. A monographic treatment on nomenclature, including synonomy and typification.
- 5. Line drawings of valid genera.
- 6. Geographic and stratigraphic occurrence of the type species.

The authors recommend purchase of two sets so that one of the sets can be arranged morphologically. Future updates will be offered at cost. Money orders or checks should be made payable to Jansonius and Hills - Genera Card File and mailed to:

#### HERBACEOUS ?

We've recently read a geochemical services company's brochure in which the term "herbaceous" was used as a kerogen term to descriptively group structured, lipid rich material such as pollen, spores, cuticles, algal remains, etc. In freshman botany we learned that the tissues of herbaceous plants or plant parts are characterized by cellulose rich parenchyma. Either botanists have changed the meaning of "herbaceous" since our day or some geochemists have misused the term. We are inclined to the latter explanation. Coal petrographers generally group lipid rich plant structures under the term "liptinite". We are not suggesting that kerogen analysts should do the same, but it is a more appropriate term for structured, lipid rich material than is "herbaceous".


