I remember the 1976 mid-year meeting in Dallas when the proposed change from using GEOSCIENCE AND MAN to a new journal format was first discussed and eventually approved by the Executive Committee. It was easy for them to suggest the change and then to tell the editor to "do it". However, from the editor's standpoint it meant an entire change in direction, working with a new group of people at the Hart Graphics Press in Austin and the logistics of collecting all of the manuscripts from the LSU Press, having them reviewed and then taking them to Austin for discussion with people at Hart Graphics. In spite of these many obstacles Rick did an outstanding job of getting the journal prepared and completed in record time. In fact, this represents one of the few times in the history of our organization that the last year's proceedings volume has been distributed to the membership more than a month before the next annual meeting was held. Work on Volume 2 of PALYNOLOGY is moving along well and I have already been in contact with the publishers at Hart Graphics in Austin. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

STRATIGRAPHIC PALYNOLOGY AND PALEOBOTANY IN BULGARIA

At the recent International Symposium on the Jurassic-Cretaceous Boundary in Bulgaria (June 1977) sponsored by the Carpatho-Balkan Geological Association, Geoff Norris had the opportunity to meet several Bulgarian palynologists and learn about their activities.

The Geological Institute of the Bulgarian Academy of Sciences (ul. Akad. G. Bonchev, Sofia 1113) employs six palynologists and paleobotanists amongst the approximately 100 scientists in the Institute. Svetlana Cernjavska heads up the laboratory, her interests centering on Paleogene spores and pollen but more recently becoming increasingly concerned with Jurassic-Cretaceous problems. Lilia Dodekova has general responsibilities for the taxonomy and stratigraphy of dinoflagellate cysts, particularly in the Jurassic and Cretaceous. Lower Paleozoic acritarchs are handled by Rossitza Kalvatcheva, while Paleozoic-Triassic spores and pollen are investigated by Julietta Lacheva. Yanaki Tenchov is responsible for megaplant studies, particularly those from the Carboniferous. Lili Zaphirova, the laboratory preparator, uses high quality modern techniques of maceration, including heavy liquid separation and minimal oxidation.

Research projects in this laboratory are combined with technical service operations for oil exploration carried out by the Committee for Geology at the Ministry of Mineral Resources. This latter organization also maintains its own geological laboratories (ul. Christo Kabrakchiev 23, Sofia 1505) where Palogene and Neogene spores and pollen are investigated by Zinaida Ipatova.

PENROSE CONFERENCE ANNOUNCEMENT

A Penrose Conference on "Modern and Fossil Dinoflagellates," sponsored by the Geological Society of America, is scheduled for April 17 - 21, 1978, in Vail, Colorado. Conveners of the conference are William R. Evitt, Stanford University; Lewis E. Stover, Exxon Production Research Company; and Karen A. Steidinger, Florida Department of Natural Resources.

This conference will provide the first opportunity for active researchers concerned with both fossil and modern dinoflagellates to join in a review of their field and some of the major problems these organisms present. The broad objective of the conference is to increase communication and understanding between two groups of scientists whose interests have been focused heretofore on different parts of the dinoflagellate life cycle and whose contacts and exchanges have been severely limited by contrasting professional backgrounds, affiliations, techniques, and goals.

Conference discussions will seek especially to explore those aspects of dinoflagellates that are of interest to both groups of investigators, such as: the dinoflagellate life cycle and cyst-motile stage relationships, morphology of cysts and thecae and classifications based upon them, evolutionary hypotheses based on either comparative studies of modern species or the fossil record, and factors controlling species distribution past and present. Certain topics primarily of interest only to neontologists (e.g., culture methodology, physiological studies, and ultrastructure of cell contents) or only to paleontologists (e.g., detailed biostratigraphic subdivision and correlation, and analysis of particular fossil assemblages) will be avoided.

Registration fee for the conference is expected to be approximately \$275 to \$300, including lodging, meals, and transportation from the airport to the meeting site and return. Attendance will be limited to approximately 70. Those interested in participating should apply by writing to W. R. Evitt, Department of Geology, Stanford University, Stanford, California 94305. Applications should include (a) name, position, and affiliation; (b) field of interest pertinent to participation in the conference; (c) topics on which the applicant is prepared to present material as a talk, as a poster display, or in group discussions. Application deadline is February 15, 1978, but earlier response will facilitate planning.


